"Captain of the CW Team" seems like a pretentious title for me for the simple little CW operation that we had during Field Day. I was the "captain" and I had only one in the crew.

However, the crew was magnificent. He was SMØDRD, Goran Fagerstrom, and he was a last minute bolunteer. If I learned anything from this Field Day, it is to depend only on the operators who show up "on time"

to help.

With one CW transmitter operating on 15, 20, 40 and 80 metres, we logged, between us and after dupes, 19 contacts on 80, 92 contacts pn 40, 334 contacts on 20 and 98 contacts on 15. This being a low blood pressure Field operation, I think that the CW operation was as good as could be expected. There was no pressure on me, thanks to Goran.

He even racked up contacts on phone between his CW operations. The equipment held up with no problems except for a glitch in

the home-brew memory keyer.

The rotator refused to turn; however, good results were obtained off the ends of the beams. When the rotator was taken down, the problem was apparent. Two wires were grounded to the frame when the rotator was mounted on the plate. We fixed the beams in

an Easterly direction.

Fred Canham's work certainly made this Field Day easy for us operators, and we thank him. Likewise, we thank the chow crew for the wonderful dinner on Saturday. This being my first Field Day operation with PAARA, I was very pleased to see the cooperation and help that each member gave the others.


I think that no one should occupy any Post longer than three years; there must be other club members who will benefit from occupying the Post, as I have.
