MEMBER PROFILE.

Richard Hefner, K2JAZ, recently joined PAARA because he is trying to learn as much about amateur radio operations as possible. Richard really enjoys the socialization aspects of ham radio and is working hard toward up-grading his license status and working DX for awards. He learned about PAARA through the 9am talk net and has felt comfortable at the monthly meetings due to the friendly membership.

Keep an eye out for Richard on an up-coming television episode of 'Evening Magazine' on KPIX, Channel 5 TV. It should be a rather interesting interview to be aired sometime within 4 weeks either side of Thanksgiving.

Richard Hefner was born in San Jose in 1945 and raised in Sacramento where he learned to play some brass instruments and became rather proficient with the trumpet. When his draft notice came in 1964, he immediately enlisted in the Army as he was considered a professional musician and qualified for an appointment to the 6th Army Band, based at the Presidio in San Francisco. Prior to this event, Richard had played trumpet in the Stan Keynton Jazz Band, a well known traveling orchestra in northern California. He had the opportunity to travel throughout the world on a regular basis with the Army and can remember the sad times when he would play 'Taps' at eight or twelve funerals a day during the Vietnam war.

After his honorable discharge from the Army, Richard worked for Volkswagen of America as a parts manager for

some time before electing to return to school in 1975. He enjoyed University so much that he earned a BA in Music; a BS in Sociology; a BS in Psychology; a BS in Behavioral Science and an MA in Counseling in Education at San Jose State University. He continued on by obtaining his MFCC (marriage & family counseling credential) which required a 4000 hour internship. Richard then earned a Ph.D. in Psychology from Stanford University and a D.D. (Doctor of Divinity) in Comparative Religions at Western Seminary in Dallas, Texas.

Richard practiced counseling on the peninsula for a number of years until 1992 when he semi-retired and decided to slow down and enjoy life a little bit. He still offers his services on a part time basis providing counseling in Santa Clara County at the Jail and Juvenile Hall. So, if any of you PAARA members believe that you need to be evaluated or counseled by a professional, Richard is the man to see. Come to think of it, there are several PAARA members that could be referred to Richard, but that is another story for another time.

Richard's first FCC license call sign was KG6WEK, however he has received a new call of K2JAZ, for obvious reasons. He currently operates an Icom 706 with either a Cushcraft R7 or a long wire, known as a 'lazy z'; a Yaesu 7800 with a Diamond tri-band antenna and several hand helds.

Please welcome K2JAZ to PAARA and introduce yourself to him at the monthly meeting or other radio event.

Field Day 2004

Field Day results have been posted on the ARRL website. PAARA easily won the # 1 category 2A spot in the Santa Clara Valley section out of 10 entries with a score of 6,004. San Mateo RC was # 2 (4,446) and FARS was # 3 (3,626.)

This year we did not win the Pacific Division for 2A. We came in # 4 out of 21 entries. But our somewhat lower score this year isn't what cost us the # 1 spot, as our best score ever would not have been enough to beat the Sonoma County Radio Amateurs, who posted an impressive score of 11,174. That made them # 4 in the nation for category 2A. Very very well done!

2 in the Pacific Division was the Mother Lode DX and contest club from Sacramento Valley (7,850) and # 3 was the Madera County ARC from San Joaquin Valley (7,254.)

Our highest ever score was 8,740 in 2003 and 7,994 in 2002. We were Pacific Division champions both those years for category 2A. So if we had repeated our results from either of those years, we would have placed # 2 this year.

PAARA was # 56 in the nation out of 455 category 2A entries. So only 12% of the entries beat our score. Not too bad.

PAARA was # 182 in the nation out of 2,249 entries for all categories. So only 8% of all the entries beat our score. That sounds even better.

Stanford was # 1 in the Pacific Division for all categories with a score of 22,694, using 8 stations on the air. Very impressive, as we would expect from them. In fact they were # 3 in the nation for all categories. They were bested only by W3AO at 32,372 (with 50 stations on the air) and KP2AA from the US Virgin Islands.

And get this. KP2AA had 25,630 points using only 4 stations, QRP power level and battery power. They produced just shy of twice as many qso's as PAARA. Wow! You can read about their effort at http://www.arrl.org/contests/soapbox/?con_id=68&call=KP2AA

With our score and qso count PAARA would have placed # 2 in the Pacific Division for category 3A and 4A and we would have won categories 5A, 6A, 7A, 8A and on up. Clearly 2A is the most competitive category.

Let's start plotting our strategy for next year right away. I'd like to see us crack 10,000 points! With good planning I think we could accomplish such a goal. If they can do it in Sonoma County we should be able to do it in Santa Clara County. 73,



Dave Rogers K5DKR

It's difficult to express the shock and sadness of Dave Roger's K5DKR's sudden and completely unexpected passing on November 8th. I knew Dave for over 30 years, back when he and I, and my next-door neighbor (now K6MTT) would chat on 11 meters CB in ninth grade. Dave was a gregarious and energetic person, and always in-



terested in making new friends and bringing people together, a true communicator. When he got his ham ticket two years ago, he immediately formed bonds with many PAARA and SCARES club members, and was almost always available on the 145.23 repeater. I can remember his monitoring Channel 9 CB decades ago, listening for any motorist in trouble, back when the band had some semblance of order. And in the past two years it was Dave who would pipe up with directions or help out with ham motorist's troubles in the Bay Area, this time on two meter FM. When I last saw him at the November PAARA meeting, there was Dave pitching in, selling PAARA badges, again bringing folks together with his easy laugh and quick humor.

Dave always loved radio and loved to share his enthusiasm with others. He was as proud to hear that my 11-year-old got his ham ticket as he was when he upgraded to General class last summer, a real personal achievement for him. And Dave had a deep sense of Bay Area history, whether it be of the roads crisscrossing Skyline or the history of his relationships with friends (and adventures, usually involving radio) stretching back decades, which he could recall as if they had just occurred.

There are "anchors" in organizations, whether they be families, schools, at work, and especially volunteer organizations like ham radio clubs. Anchors pull groups together; they focus efforts and communicate easily and effectively; they widen their circles of friends to include more and more members, and they become keepers of the organization's history. I can remember past PAARA anchors—Fred K6YT; Ed W6AIN; Bob W6BFH; Vance W6FLE; Hal W6DEF and others. Though he was only a member for a very few years, Dave Rogers had become an anchor in PAARA. We celebrate his life, we deeply mourn his tragic passing, and we all feel adrift for losing K5DKR as one of our most enthusiastic and beloved members.



The Satellite Beacon

A monthly article presented by the Project OSCAR Amateur Radio Club

One of the most important additions to amateur radio satellites has been the addition of amateur radio equipment on the International Space Station. The amateur radio equipment on the ISS allows the astronauts and cosmonauts to conduct QSOs with schools around the world, other hams, and when not in use it provides services that all hams can use. Because it is in an environment unlike other satellites (pressurized, temperature controlled) the ISS is using the same type of radio equipment many hams use on earth! With it's huge solar panels, the ISS is also not strapped for power like most amateur radio satellites, so hearing the ISS is as easy as listening to a local repeater.

How the ISS Communicates

The ISS is using a Kenwood TH-D700 and usually operates at a power of 10 watts, which is almost 20 times the power of AO-51 in low power and 5 times AO-51 in high power. With this much power, the average HT is able to hear the ISS without any modifications or upgraded antennas.

Since the TH-D700 has a built in TNC, it can operate as a APRS digipeater while in packet mode (the most used configuration), or it can be used by the astronauts and cosmonauts as a voice transceiver. Additionally the TH-D700 can operate as a cross band repeater! This means that it can also be used much like a terrestrial repeater and other amateur satellites.

Listening to the ISS

To listen to the ISS you simply have to tune to the transmit frequency that the ISS is using. The worldwide frequency for this is 145.800 MHz. If the ISS is in packet mode, you will hear packet/APRS signals similar to what you would hear on the APRS frequency (144.390 MHz). However, don't be surprised if you hear an astronaut or cosmonaut talking to school children or even other hams. If the American astronaut is having a QSO they will use the callsign NAISS. If the Russian cosmonaut is having a QSO, the callsign will be RSOISS. If you hear hams having QSOs with each other it indicates that the ISS is in voice repeat mode and open for hams around the world to use the ISS as a repeater.

Using the ISS for APRS

Using the ISS for APRS is very easy – you simply use the digipath "UNPROTO VIA ARISS" and the ISS will digipeat your APRS packets. You will need to receive on 145.800 and transmit on 437.800MHz. If you are successful, you will see your packets repeated by visiting the ISS APRS website:

Using the ISS Voice Repeater

Using the ISS voice repeater is a little more difficult. If

the ISS is in voice repeat mode, you will have to receive on 145.800 and transmit on 437.800 MHz (there is no PL tone required). However, because of doppler shift, you will need to start to tune your transmitter about 5 KHz below the center frequency when the ISS is approaching, and tune to about 5KHz above the center frequency after it passes overhead. This is very critical if you expect to be heard. It's also tricky – unless you are working full-duplex you will not be able to tell if you are making it through the repeater.

ISS QSL Cards

If you are lucky enough to log a QSO with one of the astronauts you will qualify for an ISS QSL card. Refer to the ISS website for QSL and other information at:



Computer Monitor RFI

I've had many problems with noisy computer monitors. Most computers will allow you to adjust the vertical scan rate and to move the HF frequency at which the emission occurs. Therefore, you may be able to go into your "display properties" and change the vertical scan rate and put the RFI on some unused frequency. If the video adapter is rather old you may not have too many (if any) v-frequency options, but it's worth looking into. Of course, as far as the computer user is concerned, the higher the vertical frequency, the better (less flicker) so long as you don't exceed the monitor manufacturer's specifications or run into strange video effects. The operating system (Windows 9x, at least) will usually allow you to easily go back to the old setting if things don't work quite right. 

Ray Goff G4FON maintains an interesting web site at http://www.g4fon.co.uk.

He has written shareware programs that are of interest to anyone learning Morse code. One is a CW trainer using the Koch method of teaching code. There's also a program, QSO Diary, for simple logging of contacts using a Palm PDA. His Contest Trainer uses the same basic software modules as his Koch Method CW trainer. It throws you into the thick of an imaginary contest. Callsigns are sent through your PC sound card and you are expected to copy them down, take the report and log the QSO. It can help to increase your CW copying speed while training you in contest-type or DXpedition operation.

If you like HF Pack, travel or portable operation, you'll enjoy experimenting with his design of a portable magnetic loop antenna, which folds down to a length of 20", or about the length of your forearm. This design is unique in that it has a band switch which allows operation on 20, 30 and 40 meters.



The "VideoBot" is designed to investigate remote locations and return a NTSC video signal via a 900 Mhz, 600 mw FM transmitter. The robot activity is now commanded with a standard 72Mz R/C system which controls the camera Y plane viewing angle through 160 degrees plus the direction and speed of the individual motors driving the two main wheels. The robot has extreme maneuverability. The next phase of the project is to add a GPS receiver feeding a microcomputer making the robot capable of waypoint to waypoint or autonomous navigation. The robot was built and demonstrated by


NEW "NAME BADGE COORDINATOR."
