Summer is quiet for things like contests, but there is still some good traffic on the HF bands, including some fun listening opportunities. Au-



gust is also PAARA's sponsorship month for the Flea Market. And you also have a chance to ioin me in the Land of Enchantment.

July and August are usually somewhat quiet months for ham radio, but there are still ways to have lots of fun on the HF and VHF bands. For HF, we recently had the Maritime Historical Radio Society's Night of Nights. Did you listen? It took place on July 12th, local time. It's a great opportunity to work on your CW copying skills. I listened to various messages that were transmitted, copying KPH on 4.2 MHz, 6.4 MHz, 8.6 MHz, 12.8 MHz, and 17 MHz. At my station, they were strongest on 17 MHz, which was a bit surprising to me. PAARA AND FIELD DAY A short history

Have you ever noticed that when some new thing is developed or invented, it isn't too long before a competition develops to see who's the best, the fastest, the cheapest, etc.? When man started riding horses; horse racing was soon developed, when automobiles were invented; car racing became the big thing, when radio was invented and Marconi made the first transoceanic contact; it wasn't long before radio experimenters were trying to make the longest distance contact. Well, with amateur radio, we have the same situation.

A few years after that radio experimenters, soon to be known as amateur radio operators or HAMS, evolved a contest to see who could make the largest number of contacts in a defined period of time. This came to be called field day. Yes, I know Field Day is considered an operating event to show how amateurs can operate under emergency conditions, but it is still a contest!

Field Day was first introduced by the ARRL in 1933. At the first Field Day, there were 14 participating clubs and the high score was 1470 points. Scoring then was different from now and they were calculated using the number of contacts, QSOs, and foreign contacts to develop that score. Club participation and scoring has continued to rise through the years. With the exception of the WW II years, 1942 through 1947, Field Day has been held every year since 1933. In 1936, because Field Day was so popular, there was a second Field Day held on August 22nd and 23rd.

Field Day for PAARA is a big deal. Our club works very hard to put on a Field Day event. Arguably, we set up the largest Field Day effort on the west coast. Every year in preparing for the event, we assemble, erect, test, and tune the antennas we'll use on Field Day to assure all are functioning correctly. This is no small effort but with the help of several ardent PAARA Field Day supporters, the task is always completed, usually in two days. Preparing the antennas, setting up the field day site, getting infrastructure in place, organizing generator power, operating trucks, and food supplies

takes a lot of effort and people to accomplish. In the end though, it creates a really fine showing for us.

PAARA has been involved in 52 of the 80 Field Days, or just over 64%. Over the years, we have operated in Categories 2A through 4A and 7A. The first PAARA log recorded in QST by the ARRL was in 1950. That year we made 245 contacts with a score of 2,205 points. We ranked #42 in 4A. The most recent log, which will soon be submitted to the ARRL for 2017 Field Day, shows we made 5,939 contacts with a score of 13,908 points. The results for 2017 Field Day won't be published until the November issue of QST so we won't know our ranking until then.

Our highest Field Day score ever was in 2013 when we had 4,308 contacts and scored 17,158 points. We placed 9th in 4A. The next highest was in 1983 with 5,773 contacts and 16,127 points where we were 1st in 4A. Our Category ranking ranged from 1st in 1970 and 1979 through 1983, to 201st (1967). There were years within the Field Day period where there are no listings for PAARA participation. Notably, PAARA wasn't formed until 1937 so the first Field Day years, we weren't even around. There are reasons we weren't included in Field Day. They include we didn't participate, we didn't submit a log, a log we submitted wasn't accepted, or I just missed the listing.

We have done very well over the years and continue to do so thanks to our fearless Field Day Coordinator, Doug Teter, KG6LWE, and the rest of the Field Day crew. There will be more Field Days to come with the usual PAARA efforts.

Because of the complexity of tabulating and reporting scores by hand, the Field Day results published in QST in early years was by score only, then later by category and score. In 2002, electronic tabulating was introduced to Field Day scoring and the listing on the ARRL website could then be researched by Overall Score, QSOs. Category, Sections, Participants. Because of these tabulating differences, I have chosen to focus on listings using Category as a basis. I have, however, included a table based on overall scores from 2002 thru 2016 to show our accomplishments.

Thanks to the careful and persistent efforts of Andy Korsak, KR6DD, many past issues of PAARAgraphs were saved from being lost to the historical record. He kept issues all the way back to the late 1960s.

While recently scanning all the available issues from 1971 through 2005 I made occasional notes of interesting items as I fed the yellowed pages into the scanner.

Vice President's Report: Marty, W6NEV, reported that the August speaker will be Clayton Nall, NF1R, who will present an introduction to Summits on the Air (SOTA). Ron also mentioned receiving cash from Gerry, N6NV, from sales at the Electronics Flea Market, June, \$310 and July, \$335. This cash is from the sale of "stuff" from his/PAARA's "collection". The board congratulated Gerry for his efforts. Ron also mentioned that it's been Gerry's EFM sales that have been the biggest reason PAARA has remained solvent with a strong Balance Sheet over the last many years

Under Old Business,

As you recall, on February 6th, the PAARA board sent a letter to the ASVARO board requesting they call a general meeting of all participating clubs. A meeting with the ASVARO board and other clubs was held on May 6, 2017. 




