My first experience with the highest level of ARRL leadership has been really fascinating. Aloha, before leaving for a 9-day vacation on Maui, I decided to see if there were any Ham clubs on the island. The internet can be your friend when trying to locate the unknown. Sure enough, there was one club and they just happened to be having a club meeting the week I was on the island! Turns out the meeting was in Wailuku which was about 15 minutes from Kihei which is where we were staying. After mentioning the possibility of attending a meeting to my XYL, her reply was "have a nice time, I'll be in the hot tub". Not able to find a good excuse for not going, off I went on Wednesday night.

After a bit of wandering around trying to find the room in an otherwise closed up City building, Robin, NH7U, asked if I was looking for the ham meeting. Confirming her observation, we chatted for a bit until the other members came from dinner. Seems they have a pre-meeting dinner. She mentioned the challenge at her QTH is all the so-

lar panels that have been installed on the roofs of the condo complex she lives in. This results in an S9 noise floor making it rather challenging, at best, to operate. Driving around my observations was the solar panel companies have been doing a booming business on the island as lots of buildings are covered with them.

Trip, WH6FAM, started the meeting with a few comments followed by a 5-minute introduction by each of the ~20 attendees stating their name and call along with what they'd been up to the last month. Though I ended up sitting in the front which wasn't by plan but was fortunate enough to be near the end. I introduced myself, whereupon a couple of members stated thinking they had me in their log. It's possible as I have several Hawaiian calls in the log. I then commented about PAARA mentioning that we are one year younger than the KH6RS club is. As I had noticed a bit on their website about Field Day, I made a short mention about our efforts. Several members mentioned remembering the W6ARA call. One other tidbit, Jim Tiemstra, K6JAT, the new Pacific Division Director for the ARRL was at the meeting. I had an opportunity to chat with him briefly at the end of the meeting.

After short updates from members involved with Hawaiian repeaters, emergency services, and Hawaii related ham events, Ron, KY6N, gave the group a very good and detailed presentation on remote operation. Seems Ron has a house in Oregon City where he has an HF rig which he operates from wherever he is. Over the years he's used many different rigs and a few different approaches to working remote. He's also found workarounds for about every failure mode possible. You can check out his experiences at www.WY6N.com where he has a bunch of information on remote operation. You can also check out his Maui station at www.KH6AH.com, which is affectionately known as the "Hawaii Internet Remote Amateur Radio Club Station".

The presentation was followed by a short discussion on the Field Day setup for KH6RS. They set up and operate near mile marker 9 and Ho'okipa Beach Park in a pasture. Don't worry, the cows are removed for the weekend. Not sure about the cow pies though. The beach is located off highway 36, the Hana Hwy. The conversation sounded much like our planning meetings, how many stations, what antennas, what modes etc. I think

July 18, 2018, Board Meeting

The meeting was held at Marty's QTH, commencing at 7:14 PM on July 18, 2018. In attendance were Kristen McIntyre, K6WX (Pres), Marty Wayne, W6NEV (VP), Ron Chester, W6AZ (Treasurer) via videoconference, Jim Thielemann, K6SV (Secretary/Membership), Larry Rebarchik, N6DB (Dir) via videoconference, Darryl Presley, K16LDM (Dir), Walter Gyger K6WGY(Dir), and non-board members Clark Martin, KK6ISP, (ASVARO Representative), and Harry Cline, K4YR. A quorum was present.

Kristen, (K6WX), opened the meeting with a discussion regarding the challenge in finding members to step up and volunteer to take on club business. She mentioned Price's Law, "50% of the work is done by the square root of the total number of people who participate in the work". Thus, I with a membership of 180, that means 13.5 people do 50% of the work. The only event we blow Price's Law out of the water is Field Day, and it's a good thing otherwise Field Day would not be the event we currently enjoy.

As the board felt there isn't a list of activities that need volunteers, thus members don't know the areas they can help, Clark, KK6ISP, volunteered to compile a list of volunteer opportunities that members can help the club with. In the coming month(s), he will circulate the list of volunteer opportunities to the membership. Hopefully, there will be something on the list that you can assist IPAARA with. Most of the opportunities don't require much time but do require a commitment to accomplish.

Kristen mentioned her reserve of stories continues to be low, thus there is a need for more. Please, if you've committed to a story but not submitted it (there are several people out there fitting this category) put pen to paper or fingers on the keyboard and let your creative juices flow! Vice President's Report: Marty, W6NEV, announced the August speaker is Joe Pistritto, N3CKF, who will give a talk on the deployment process to Puerto Rico in the aftermath of Hurricane Maria in support of the ARRL and served agencies. Marty also mentioned that he has speakers booked for the remainder of the year. Doug, KG6LWE, mentioned during Field Day that next year he plans on reserving them for Thursday instead of Friday. We'll have to wait until next year to see if that works any better.

I Jim, K6SV, reported on the Field Day results.
I Having just finished the ARRL report, he provided information on how we did this year. The bottom line is that we scored 2,124 fewer points than last year. The total points for this year were 11,976 with 9,876 of them being from QSO's and 1,920 from Bonus points. Missing from the bonus points this year were the W1AW message and a Satellite contact. Though a breakdown was provided to the board, I'll not go into here but we made 807 fewer contacts this year than last. The information will be at the August meeting.

Darryl, KI6LDM, mentioned having gotten behind generating the new ham lists due to Field Day. The lists for the last two months were forwarded to Rachel, KK6DAC, for mailing of the new member invitation cards. She reported back that the cards are "in the mail". Great job Rachel!

There was a short follow up conversation regarding the current cost of PAARA badges. A bit more information is still needed before making any decision but it's more than likely the cost of badges may increase as the engraving costs seem to have increased. However, the board noted that the cost vs income for badges in 2016 and 2017 reflected a slight income in both years. Thus, if there is any shortfall from the sale of badges, it's a new occurrence. One note starting in July, Marty, W6NEV, volunteered to pick-up the badges from the engraver instead of paying to have them shipped to Doug, KG6LWE. This may be enough to keep the badge prices as they are for now.

There are several other items on the agenda that haven't been worked on very much or could wait until the next meeting, thus at this point there is no new news on them.

Under New Business:

The board thanks Marty for lightening Doug's load and shipping them off.
