The Kepler Mission, in Search of Exoplanets William J. Borucki

Mr. Borucki earned a graduate and undergraduate studies in Physics at the University of Wisconsin, Madison, and an MS, Meteorology, California State University, San Jose. In 1962, he joined the Hypersonic Free Flight Branch at the NASA Ames Research Center.

From 1962 through 1972, Mr. Borucki conducted laboratory and theoretical studies of the radiation and plasma environments of entry vehicles. In 1972, after the successful Moon landings, he transferred to the Theoretical. Studies Branch where he developed mathematical models of the Earth's stratosphere to predict the effects of nitric oxides and chlorofluoromethanes on the ozone layer.

In 1984, he began advocating the development of a space mission that could detect Earth-size planets and determine the frequency of Earth-size planets in the habitable zone of Sun-like stars. His proposal to the NASA • Discovery Program for the Kepler Mission was selected for funding in 2001 and he was appointed its Principal Investigator.

Mr. Borucki retired in 2015 from the NASA Ames Research Center. He continues his research as an Ames Associate.

Mr. Borucki has received many awards, the most recent

The PAARA sponsored ASVARO Electronics Flea Market at Fry's Electronics in Sunnyvale was a great success for the club. We had perfect weather. Arriving well before dawn, it wasn't very cold, and it wasn't long before Jim, K6SV, and Darryl, Kl6LDM, had the tent set up and ready to go. Jim had hauled all of the gear in from its temporary parking spot at Darryl's house. The coffee was brewed at home by Darryl so we'd be ready to sell as soon as people were ready to buy. Our gate crew, including Clark, KK6ISP, Paul KK6HWN, Seth, KE6UZX, and Harry, K4YR, got the vendors through the

WHISKY TWO HOTEL

This July in New York City there was a biannual hacker convention (www.hope.net) where a group of attending hams set up and operated a special event station W2H. PAARA members Thomas W4TCP, Rachel K3SLE and your author Henry W6REK were among them.

Thomas and myself brought the transceiver for the HF station, an IC-7100 100W mobile HF rig with an LDG IC-100 antenna tuner and a laptop for FT8. Another ham brought a nice Motorola UHF repeater and coordinated a frequency pair

in the 440's where we could operate it at 20W for the weekend. Since we put our antennas up on the roof of the 20story hotel, that 20W went a good ways into neighboring states. Other hams brought five 150' lengths of feedline, an off -center-fed (OCF) 80m dipole for the HF station, a discone antenna for VHF operations, a vertical antenna for the UHF repeater, and lots of miscellaneous gear.

I had been told by Eric N6SPP that there had been 6m and 10m openings recently on the east coast, and luckly we found some using the IC-7100 and the 80m OCF. I had SSB phone con- Henry & Thomas on the roof during setup. tacts in Georgia and Ala-

bama on 10m and with an eastern Texas station on 6m. We had no luck with SSB on lower bands, and only made contacts on 20m and 40m with FT8, but we did reach over a dozen countries in Europe that way. On the roof there was an extra shed that we think interfered with the long end of the OCF and kept it from working well on the low bands. On 80m the noise floor in the middle of Manhattan was S9+10, making that band pretty useless.

The repeater was busy for a lot of the weekend. We used it especially to coordinate between people at the operating station and people setting up or taking down antennas on the roof. It also experienced a good bit of nonsense and borderline abuse by people not at the conference, but so it goes. In other project, one ham tried running an old-school packet BBS on 2m, but his equipment had problems and was not stable.

Our operating station was set up on the top con-

ference floor of the hotel, right where people go in & out of the main speaker track room, so we had plenty of people stopping by and showing interest. There was a class for novices on Friday and license exams on Sunday, where several dozen new hams got licensed and a good number upgraded their license.

Since we had over a dozen good hams helping out, it wasn't that hard on any one person to make this happen. We coordinated most of it in a single email thread and used a shared spreadsheet to volunteer to bring equipment. Getting a 1x1 special event station call sign and coordination for a repeater for

the weekend was not a problem. It did help that we had done this in prior years, and we try not to make the same mistake twice.

So you might want to think about public events that you attend where a ham radio station would be a welcome distraction!
